

In November, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi demonstrated commitstrong road ment to safety and discipline by issuing a total of 64758 challans. These included 692 for no parking, 1729 for signal violations, 757 for one-way violations, and 2685 for lane and line offenses. The department

also addressed 8291 cases of driving without a license, 7096for excessive smoke emissions, and 1434 for juvenile driving. Additionally, 1349 vehicles were challaned for lacking fitness certificates, and 2318 tickets were issued for route permit violations. Safety efforts extended to motorcyclists with 3294 helmet-related offenses and the issuance of 25914 licenses to the public. This robust enforcement reflects the Traffic Police's continued dedication to improving road safety and order in Rawalpindi.



Anti-Congestion Campaign

In November, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi successfully eliminated traffic congestion kev areas through its in anti-congestion campaign. Notable improvements include smoother traffic flow on Allied Bank Road, Misriyal Road, and Kiyani Road, where bottlenecks were effectively cleared. At TM Chowk, DHA Sedan, Mehfooz Chowk, and GPO Chowk, proactive measures reduced delays, enhancing mobility and ease for commuters.

During rush hours, mild traffic congestion has been reported at key points such as Chour Chowk, Range Chowk, Adam G Road, and the Harley

Street Turn. Additionally, areas like Metro Station, Railway Road, and Mehfooz Chowk experience moderate delays, though efforts are underway to manage the flow and improve traffic conditions.

Despite the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi's best efforts, some points still witnessed congestion during rush hours at key points like Naseerabad Stop, Rafay Mall, Qasim Market Chowk, GTS Chowk, Dhoke Syedan Chowk, Liaqat Road, and Fawara Chowk. While no blockages have been reported, the flow of traffic remains slow due to the high volume of school traffic and business activities in these areas as some points like GTS, Dhoke Syedan, Fawara Chowk and Liaqat road are hub of business activities in Rawalpindi. The City Traffic Police is working diligently to remove traffic congestion in these areas in close contact with other departments.

LICENSE SECTION

The City Traffic Police Rawalpindi's licensing campaign in November marked a significant achievement in fostering responsible driving and ensuring safer roads for all. A total of **25914** licenses were issued, reflecting the department's proactive approach to empowering citizens with the proper credentials for safe and lawful driving. Among these, **23748** were for motorcycle licenses, underscoring the importance of ensuring that motorcyclists are properly trained and



qualified. The campaign also saw the issuance of 1777 licenses for motor car drivers, 178 for Light Transport Vehicles (LTV), and 211 licenses were issued for motor rickshaws, ensuring that drivers of this vital mode of transport are also equipped with the necessary skills and knowledge.

OUR LICENSING CENTERS AND MOBILE VAN

The main Traffic Headquarters at Qasim Market serves as the central hub, offering comprehensive licensing services for residents of Rawalpindi. In addition, the Cantt Licensing Centre and the Shahbaz Sharif Centre cater to the needs of citizens in key locations, making it easier for people to access services without having to travel long distances.For residents in outlying areas, the Traffic Police has set up additional centers in Gujar Khan, Kahuta, Kallar, and Taxila, extending licensing services to these communities and ensuring that rural and suburban residents are not left behind.

To further enhance accessibility, the Mobile Education Van plays a crucial role in the licensing campaign. This specially equipped van travels to various locations across Rawalpindi, bringing the licensing process directly to the people. This innovative approach reflects the City Traffic Police's commitment to public convenience, safety, and promoting responsible driving throughout Rawalpindi and its surrounding regions.



ACCIDENTS IN NOVEMBER IN RAWALPINDI

In November 2024, Rawalpindi witnessed a concerning number of accidents within areas managed by the City Traffic Police. A total of 7 fatal accidents were reported, leading to 7 tragic fatalities. Additionally, 20 non-fatal accidents occurred, resulting in 23 individuals sustaining injuries. These incidents highlight the ongoing challenge of road safety in a city with a massive and ever-growing population. Despite the tireless efforts of the City Traffic Police to reduce accidents through awareness campaigns, enforcement, and road improvements, the sheer volume of traffic in Rawalpindi continues to contribute to road mishaps.

ROAD SAFETY AWARENESS

Road safety is a critical global concern, with over 1.3 million lives lost annually due to road traffic accidents, according to the World Health Organization (WHO). Over speeding contributes to approximately 30% of these fatalities, while distracted driving, particularly from mobile phone use, causes tens of thousands of crashes each year. Following traffic rules significantly mitigates these risks. For instance, wearing a seat belt reduces the risk of death in a crash by up to 45% for front-seat passengers and 50% for those in the rear.

One-wheeling and over speeding pose serious dangers, particularly during the festive season, such as New Year Eve in December in Rawalpindi, when reckless behavior on the roads often escalates. These activities not only put the riders at grave risk but also endanger other road users. Parents, in particular, play a pivotal role in curbing these practices. By instilling road sense in their children from a young age and discouraging reckless behaviors like one-wheeling and overspeeding, parents can prevent tragedies and contribute to safer roads.

Metropolitan cities like Mumbai and Delhi in India, Jakarta in Indonesia, and Istanbul in Turkey offer valuable examples of traffic management. These cities highlight the importance of technology, infrastructure, and civic cooperation in creating safer and more efficient traffic systems—lessons Rawalpindi can learn from to improve its own road safety and traffic management. Civil society in Rawalpindi must actively collaborate with the traffic police to improve road conditions and ensure safer traffic flow.

Due to the irresponsible behavior of parents, a young child, Abdul Ahad, in Kallar Syedan was hit by a bike and was urgently taken to the emergency unit at BBH Hospital in Rawalpindi. In response, Circle Officer Ali Rafique was deputed by the Chief Traffic Officer of Rawalpindi to ensure the child and his family received all necessary support and care. By the grace of God, the child has now recovered and is doing well. This incident serves as a reminder of the critplay in ensuring their children safety on the roads.



RAWALPINDI: The City Traf-fic Police Rawalpindi intensified its campaign against make-emitting an non compliant public transport rehictes. Acting on the di-tectives of Chief Traffic Offirectives of cheel trainc offi-cer (CTO) Rewalpindi, the police have issued 10,814 challans since August 25, 2024, These Include 5,060 2024. 
