







MONTHLY PERFORMANCE OF CTP RWP














In February 2025, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi reinforced its commitment to road safety and law enforcement by issuing a total of 79896 challans for various traffic violations. These included 821 challans for illegal parking, 1637 signal violations, 835 challans for one way violation and 5246 for lane and line discipline offenses. The dealso partment against action strict unlicensed driving, pe-

nalizing 17592 violators, while juvenile driving cases resulted in 2691 fines. Additionally, 636 vehicles were fined for excessive smoke emissions, ensuring environmental safety.

The enforcement efforts also targeted public service vehicles, with 1268 challans issued for missing fitness certificates and 2547 for violations of route permits. The safety of motorcyclists remained a key focus, with 15742 challans issued for riding without a helmet. Furthermore, the department cracked down on fancy number plates, issuing 2822 tickets to ensure compliance with standard registration requirements.

These figures highlight the dedication of the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi in ensuring road safety and traffic discipline across the city. By combining strict enforcement with ongoing public awareness campaigns, the department continues to work towards a safer and more organized traffic system for all road users.

LICENSING BRANCH

In January 2025, the License Branch of the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi continued to facilitate citizens with an efficient and transparent licensing process. A total of 17,553 driving licenses were issued, reflecting the department's commitment to road safety and legal compliance. Among these, 16,555 licenses were for motorcycles, 706 for motorcars and jeeps, 110 for light transport vehicles (LTV), 182 for motor rickshaws, and 84 for heavy transport vehicles (HTV). These numbers highlight the increasing public awareness of the importance of obtaining a valid driving license, ensuring safer roads and responsible driving within the city.



MOBILE LICENSING UNIT

The Mobile Licensing Unit of the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi is a revolutionary step towards making licensing services more accessible and hassle-free. This unit travels across various parts of the city, including busy chowks, public places, and private institutions, bringing all licensing facilities directly to citizens' doorsteps. By eliminating the need for long commutes and reducing wait times, the mobile unit ensures that more people can obtain legal driving licenses with ease.



LICENSING CENTRES

To facilitate citizens and reduce congestion at the main Traffic Headquarters, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi has established multiple licensing centers across key locations. These centers, situated in Cantt, Shahbaz Sharif Park, Gujar Khan, Kahuta, Kallar Syedan, and Taxila, provide greater accessibility and convenience for applicants. By decentralizing the licensing process, the department ensures that citizens can obtain their driving licenses closer to their localities, minimizing travel hassles and wait times.

TRAFFIC DUTY AT CHAMPION TROPHY

In February 2025, Pakistan proudly hosted the Champions Trophy, with three key matches held at the Rawalpindi Cricket Statraffic during dium. Managing high-profile events is a challenging task, as the stadium sits at a critical intersection between Rawalpindi and Islamabad. With thousands of spectators flocking to the venue and VVIP security protocols in place for the cricket teams, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi undertook a massive effort to ensure smooth traffic flow across the city. Despite the complexities of VVIP movements, which often lead to prolonged road closures and congestion, the Traffic Police implemented a comprehensive traffic management plan. Alternative routes were designated in advance, additional traffic personnel were deployed at key points, and real-time traffic updates were provided to the diversions public. Strategic well-coordinated efforts between traffic officials ensured that even during peak match hours, traffic remained under control.

As a result of these measures, no major traffic blockages were reported, and citizens of Rawalpindi and Islamabad commended the department's efficiency. The seamless execution of traffic plans allowed cricket fans to reach the stadium without unnecessary delays while ensuring that routine city traffic was not severely affected. This outstanding performance highlights the dedication and professionalism of the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi, reaffirming its commitment to public convenience and security.





SPECIAL DUTIES ON MALL ROAD SIGNAL FREE PROJECT

In February 2025, the FWO & Government of Punjab initiated a significant infrastructure project to transform Mall Road into a signal-free corridor, aiming to alleviate persistent traffic congestion in the city. This ambitious plan includes the construction of a state-of-the-art underpass stretching from TM Chowk (Shalimar Chowk) to MH Chowk, featuring both double-barrel and single-barrel sections, along with dedicated pedestrian pathways. The project, approved by Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz, is expected to be completed within a two-month timeframe, with construction commencing on February 17, 2025.

Recognizing the critical importance of Mall Road as a primary traffic artery in Rawalpindi, the City Traffic Police (CTP) have proactively implemented comprehensive measures to maintain smooth traffic flow during the construction phase. A detailed traffic diversion plan has been developed, involving the deployment of over 150 additional traffic wardens to manage alternative routes and ensure minimal disruption. To keep the public informed, the CTP has established round-the-clock helplines and actively utilizes social media platforms to provide real-time traffic updates and guidance on alternative pathways.

Despite the inherent challenges posed by such a large-scale infrastructure project, the concerted efforts of the CTP have been instrumental in preventing major traffic blockages. Citizens have expressed appreciation for the effective traffic management strategies, noting that, despite increased traffic volumes on alternative routes, congestion has been kept to a minimum. This proactive approach underscores the CTP's dedication to public convenience and safety, ensuring that urban development initiatives proceed without causing undue hardship to daily commuters













SPECIAL CAMPAIGNS DURING FEBRUARY

DOUBLE HELMET CAMPAIGN

Continuing from January, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi has intensified its Double Helmet Awareness Campaign throughout February. This initiative aims to reinforce the importance of wearing helmets for both riders and passengers, significantly reducing head injuries in case of accidents. Awareness drives have been expanded, with special awareness lectures in schools, colleges, and public spaces. The campaign also involves digital outreach through social media platforms, ensuring the message reaches a broader audience.





CAMPAIGN AGAINST OVERLOADING SCHOOL VANS

Overloading in school vans poses a severe risk to children's safety. In February, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi has intensified inspections of school vans to ensure compliance with passenger limits. Special teams have been deployed outside major schools and educational institutions to monitor school transport. Strict fines are being issued for violations, and school administrations have been urged to ensure safer transport options for students. Public awareness campaigns targeting parents and van operators have been expanded, reinforcing the need to prioritize child safety over commercial gain. The campaign has already yielded positive results, with a noticeable decline in overloaded school vans.



ANTI ENCROACHMENT CAMPAIGN

Anti-Encroachment Campaign remains a top priority in February, as the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi continues its efforts to clear busy commercial and residential areas from illegal obstructions. Throughout the month, anti-encroachment teams have conducted daily operations in Raja Bazar, Adyala Road, Misrial Road, Murree Road, and other congested areas. Shopkeepers and vendors have been repeatedly warned, and strict actions, including fines and removal of illegal stalls, are being taken against repeat offenders.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST NO PARKING

Following the success of the No-Parking Campaign in January, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi has extended its drive against illegal parking in February. The focus remains on areas experiencing high commercial and educational traffic, including Raja Bazar, Commercial Market, Saddar, Mall Road, and key school zones. Special teams have been assigned to patrol these areas regularly, ensuring that vehicles are parked only in designated spots. So far, over 5502 vehicles have been penalized for violating parking regulations.



CAMPAIGN AGAINST OVERLOADING

To further strengthen road safety, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi has intensified its campaign against overloaded vehicles. Heavy transport vehicles exceeding their load limits contribute to road damage and pose serious accident risks. Throughout February, strict checking points have been set up at entry and exit points of the city, ensuring that overloaded vehicles are either fined or offloaded before continuing their journey. Transporters are being warned against violating weight limits, and awareness campaigns are being conducted at major transport terminals to educate drivers on the risks of overloading.



PSV MONITORING

The Public Service Vehicle (PSV) Monitoring Campaign continues in February with enhanced focus on fitness certificates, driver licenses, and route permits. Teams are conducting surprise checks at key transport hubs to ensure that all commercial vehicles meet safety and operational standards. This month, hundreds of PSVs have been inspected, leading to penalties and warnings for unfit vehicles and unlicensed drivers.









INAGURATION OF NEW TOWN TRAFFIC OFFICE

The New Town Traffic Office has undersignificant transformation, gone а emerging modern as а fully-equipped facility that enhances both staff efficiency and public convenience. Previously, the office faced various operational challenges due to space constraints and outdated infrastructure. With its renovation and expansion, it now provides a well-organized, spaand accessible environment, ensuring better service delivery and a more comfortable experience for the public.

The previous office setup was highly congested, making it difficult for traffic officials and visitors alike. The staff of two traffic sectors had to manage their duties within a cramped space, often causing operational inefficiencies. Additionally, citizens visiting for challan payments and licensing matters had to deal with overcrowding and limited seating arrangements. There was also no dedicated space for official meetings or public awareness sessions. The new office, however, has completely transformed the situation by offering spacious offices where traffic personnel can work efficiently, and women staff members can handle female visitors separately, ensuring privacy and ease for all.

One of the most notable additions to the New Town Office is the inclusion of the Circle Officer's Office within the building. This ensures that operational matters, coordination between staff, and public grievances can be addressed more efficiently under one roof. With senior officers present at the location, public deal-

ings have become more streamlined, and any traffic-related concerns can be resolved more swiftly.

Another major development is the establishment of a Driving School within the New Town Office. Previously, individuals from Chandni Chowk, Faizabad, and even Islamabad had to travel all the way to Traffic Headquarters for driving school registration and training. Now, with this facility available nearby, it is far more convenient for aspiring drivers to receive proper training and legally acquire their licenses. This step encourages more people to obtain a valid driving license, ultimately contributing to better road safety and disciplined driving in Rawalpindi.

The addition of a modern conference hall is another key upgrade in the New Town Office. This space enables traffic officials to conduct regular training sessions, operational meetings, and public awareness programs without interruptions. The conference hall will also serve as a venue for engaging with different stakeholders, including citizens, students, and driving school trainees, ensuring wider outreach and education on road safety and traffic rules.

The New Town Traffic Office now stands as a model facility, combining modern infrastructure, expanded space, and enhanced public services under one roof. With the Circle Officer's Office, a fully operational Driving School, and a designated conference hall, this transformation reflects the department's commitment to modernization and better public facilitation. This initiative not only improves efficiency but also strengthens the City Traffic Police's mission to ensure a well-managed, safe, and disciplined traffic system for Rawalpindi.


















ANTI CONGESTION CAMPAIGN



In February 2025, the City Traffic Police Rawalpindi successfully eliminated congestion in several key areas, ensuring a smoother and more organized traffic flow. Notable locations where congestion has been completely cleared include Family Ward Chowk. Nursing Home, Harley Hospital Chowk, Railway Road Area, Mero Station, Naka Signal Battalion, Safeerabad Turn, Citi Lab, Iran Road, Trolley Adda, and Abdullah Masjid. These improvements reflect the department's proactive enforcement, better route management, and strategic deployment of wardens, ultimately providing relief to commuters and enhancing overall road safety.

During February 2025, mild congestion was observed in certain areas, primarily due to external factors like construc-

tion and high traffic volume during peak hours. Locations such as Misrial Bazar, Akseer Plaza, Bhoosa Godaam, and Tali Mohri Chowk experienced slower traffic flow, with some points being adjacent to schools, leading to increased vehicle movement during opening and closing hours.

During February 2025, heavy congestion was observed at Beaconhouse School, Mall Road, Race Course Turn, TNT Chowk, Liaqat Road, Qasar-e-Sheeren, Chungi No. 22, Rawal Road Turn, Naka Katarian, and Education Office U-turn. The primary cause of this congestion was the ongoing Mall Road Signal-Free Corridor Project, which diverted Mall Road's extensive traffic onto alternative routes passing through MH to Shalimar Chowk, with diversions routed via Saddar and Chungi No. 22—both of which are narrow and not designed to accommodate such a high traffic volume.


INTERVIEW WITH SENIOR TRAFFIC OFFICER SP MUNEER HASHMI

Q1: We congratulate you on your new posting in City Traffic Police Rawalpindi. How do you see this new role and what are your initial thoughts?

STO Muneer Hashmi: Thank you! It is truly an honor to serve in Rawalpindi, a city with complex traffic dynamics due to its historical significance and connectivity to Islamabad. My priority is to ensure smooth traffic flow, enhance road safety, and implement modern traffic management strategies.



STO Muneer Hashmi: The Mall Road Signal-Free Project is a major development that will significantly improve traffic flow once completed. However, during the construction phase, managing traffic is a challenge. We have deployed additional personnel at key points to guide motorists and ensure minimal disruption. Diversion plans are in place, and we are continuously monitoring the situation to make adjustments as needed.



STO Muneer Hashmi: Managing traffic during such a high-profile event, especially at a location like Rawal-

pindi Cricket Stadium, which sits at the intersection of Rawalpindi and Islamabad, was a significant challenge. Our focus was twofold: ensuring smooth traffic flow and providing top-level security to the teams. I am proud to say that, despite the VVIP movements and heavy traffic, we ensured that the public faced minimal inconvenience. This was a team effort, and I appreciate the dedication of all officers involved.

Q4: Ramadan is about to begin, and commercial areas like Raja Bazar experience heavy traffic, serving not only Rawalpindi but also northern areas. How will you manage traffic duty in these areas?

STO Muneer Hashmi: Ramadan is always a challenging time for traffic management, especially in business hubs like Raja Bazar, Saddar, and Commercial Market, where the rush increases manifold. We have devised a comprehensive plan to ensure strict enforcement of no-parking zones, and manage pedestrian movement efficiently.
